

Homework Activities... Spring Term 1 2025

Choose one activity to complete each week. Put any evidence of the activity into your homework book and bring into school by Wednesday every week

Please tick and date the activity you have completed, even if you have emailed your homework. Be creative in your homework and have some fun.

Postcard - Pretend you have visited a beach. Write a postcard from your destination to a family member or friend. Don't forget to use adjectives to describe where you are and what you can see.

Maps - Using a map of the British Isles, label the seas and countries. Can you mark where Hereford is?

Recycling Part 1 - Look at your rubbish at home (with help from a grownup) and find out if it can be recycled. How do you sort your recycling?



Recycling Part 2 - Reuse some of your recycling items to create a sea creature.

Water Safety - We need to make sure we are safe when near the water. Create a list of rules we should follow to keep us safe, whether we are near the sea, river, lake or a pond. Make sure your sentences are clear and direct.

Make - Design and build a boat. You can use any materials that you can find around the house from tin foil to a plastic tub. Can you make a sail for your boat? Will your boat float? How many pennies can you put inside your boat before it sinks?

Octonauts - Choose an episode of The Octonauts to watch on the BBC iPlayer using the following link <https://www.bbc.co.uk/iplayer/episodes/b00xhyjf/octonauts> afterwards, find out some information about the sea creature that was the main focus of the episode that you watched. Draw a picture of your chosen creature and write down the facts around the picture, like a mind map of ideas.

Practise your reading, spellings and counting in 2s, 5s, and 10s a few times every week. We have also been counting in 3s! Don't forget, you can practise your spellings using EdShed (log in details are in your reading record).

Time - Continue to practise telling the time using the terms, o'clock, half past, quarter past and quarter to. Once you have a good understanding, begin to practise telling the time to 5 minute intervals.
